We are created for eternal joy, and we must strive to attain that. The mistake we often make is substituting satisfaction for joy. Satisfaction can make us happy. However, happiness is fleeting. We can be happy now but can be sad after a few moments. Worldly desires and physical discomforts will bother us. Joy on the other hand is not subject to issues of earthly pain or problems because it comes from the Holy Spirit. We can be suffering and still be joyful.

So let us strive to have the joy of the Holy Spirit which is in fellowship with the Father and His Son, Jesus Christ. In celebrating the Mass and worship from the bottom of our hearts, we find fellowship with the Holy Trinity. The Apostle John wrote about it in 1 John 1:3-4, "What we have seen and heard we proclaim now to you, so that you may have fellowship with us; for our fellowship is with the Father and with His Son, Jesus Christ. We are writing this so that our joy may be complete."
